


- Amendment: A change to the U.S. Constitution.
- Bill of Rights: The first ten amendments to the U.S. Constitution, which guarantee certain individual rights and freedoms.
- Checks and balances: A system of government in which different branches of government have the ability to limit the power of other branches.
- Civil liberties: The rights and freedoms that are guaranteed to all citizens by the U.S. Constitution.
- Civil rights: The rights that are guaranteed to all citizens by law, regardless of race, gender, religion, or national origin.
- Common law: The system of law that is based on the decisions of judges in previous cases.
- Constitution: The supreme law of the United States.
- Delegated powers: The powers that are explicitly granted to the federal government by the U.S. Constitution.

- Equal protection clause: The clause of the Fourteenth Amendment to the U.S. Constitution that prohibits states from denying any person "within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws."
- Federalism: A system of government in which power is divided between a central government and regional governments.
- Foreign policy: The policies that a government adopts in its dealings with other countries.
- **Fundamental rights:** The rights that are considered to be essential to human dignity and freedom.
- Habeas corpus: A writ that requires a person who is being held in custody to be brought before a judge to determine whether the person is being held lawfully.
- Impeachment: The process by which a president or other highranking government official is accused of wronging and removed from office.
- Judicial review: The power of the courts to declare laws unconstitutional.
- Law: A rule of conduct that is created and enforced by the government.
- **Legislative branch:** The branch of government that makes laws.
- Limited government: A system of government in which the powers of the government are limited by a constitution or other legal document.
- Majority rule: The principle that the majority of people should have the power to make decisions for the entire group.

- Natural law: The system of law that is based on the principles of reason and justice.
- Popular sovereignty: The principle that the government derives its authority from the consent of the governed.
- Preamble: The to the U.S. Constitution, which states the purposes of the Constitution.
- Presidency: The office of the president of the United States.
- Reserved powers: The powers that are not explicitly granted to the federal government by the U.S. Constitution and are therefore reserved to the states.
- Rule of law: The principle that everyone, including the government, is subject to the law.
- Separation of powers: The principle that the powers of government should be divided among different branches of government.
- Sovereignty: The supreme authority of a government over its territory and people.
- Supremacy clause: The clause of the U.S. Constitution that establishes the Constitution as the supreme law of the land.
- Treaty: An agreement between two or more countries.
- Veto: The power of the president to reject a bill passed by Congress.




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
